

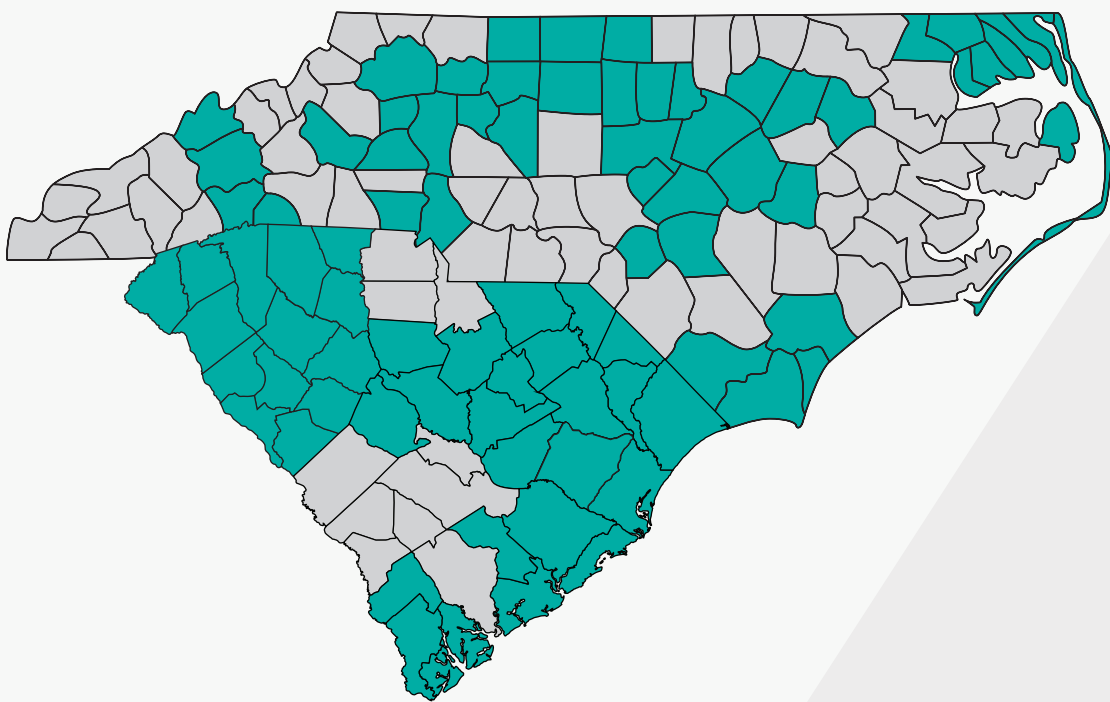

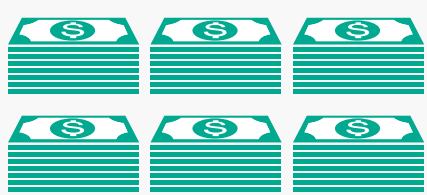
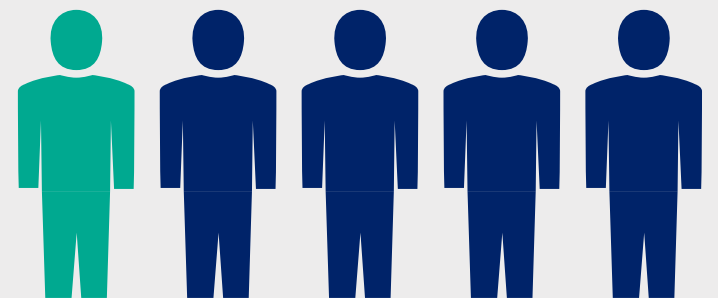
AccessHealth networks are community-based systems of care composed of a broad range of healthcare providers and other health-related resources working in collaboration to leverage resources and align services for the uninsured in North and South Carolina. The overall goal of an AccessHealth network is to improve patient health outcomes through care continuity and access to primary and specialty care services.

There are 30 AccessHealth networks representing 80 counties across North and South Carolina.



73,866 active patients in AccessHealth networks

1 out of 5 low-income uninsured people in counties are enrolled in these networks



AccessHealth networks provided medical care **valued at over \$582 million** and avoided \$78 million in hospital costs

14,500

total **physicians are participating** in networks across North & South Carolina

Technical assistance supports the efficiency and improvement of network processes along the following four goals:

- **Building network capacity**
- **Establishing a data-driven culture**
- **Spurring learning across networks**
- **Engaging health systems**

Diabetes Priority Metric – This is the AH networks first time reporting this metric. It shows the percentage of network patients that have poorly controlled diabetes. This is defined by an A1c > 9 or no A1c available within a year. For this time period, the average percent of patients with poorly controlled diabetes across all networks is 36.8%
